2025 Adult Summer Reading Program

The TBBL Adult Summer Reading Program will start May 1, 2025, and will run through August 31. The theme this year is "Color Our World." Thanks to a generous gift from the Jones Foundation, everyone who completes the program by reading 20 books will receive a free set of charging cables. The cables have USB-A and USB-C input connectors and both iPhone and Android compatible output connectors.

If you participated last year, then you will automatically be signed up for this year's program. If you are not already signed up, please contact your reader advisor! Audio books, Braille books, large print books and audio magazines all count. We will keep track of your reading history. Happy reading!

WRBH Radio for the Blind

WRBH 88.3 FM is a New Orleans based 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and is the only full-time reading service on the FM dial in the United States. Here is their mission: WRBH transforms the printed word into the spoken word, ensuring that the blind and print-impaired have the same access to information as their sighted peers.

The roots of WRBH go back to the mid-1970s when founder Dr. Robert McClean, a blind mathematician, leased airtime from WWNO and began reading local newspapers over the radio. In 1982 McClean purchased the 88.3 FM signal. In 2000 WRBH started live streaming and podcasting, making their programming accessible to a global audience.

WRBH Radio for the Blind 88.3 FM broadcasts a wide range of content 24/7, from local and national news to best-selling books, magazine articles, and cooking shows. Their schedule includes best-selling non-fiction as well as great literature and even vintage radio programs. They do all this with the help

of 150 volunteers who donate 5,000 hours of their time every year.

WRBH's FM signal reaches a 90-mile radius across parts of Louisiana and Mississippi; their streaming and podcasting reaches listeners worldwide. For more information, visit their website at www.wrbh.org or call them at 504-899-1144.

Two Useful Smartphone Apps

Seeing AI is a free iOS app from Microsoft that is designed to provide audio descriptions of the world to people with visual impairments. Users point their phone's camera and turn the visual world into an audible experience with descriptions of people, text, and objects, using the power of Artificial Intelligence (AI). Using VoiceOver, the app enables users to recognize:

- Short Text Speaks text as soon as it appears in front of the camera.
- Products Scans barcodes, using audio beeps to guide you; hear the name, and package information when available. (works with iPhone 6 and later)
- People Saves people's faces so you can recognize them, and get an estimate of their age, gender, and emotions.
- Scenes (early preview) Hear an overall description of the scene captured.
- Images in other apps Just tap

"Share" and "Recognize with Seeing Al" to describe images from Mail, Photos, X, and more.

Be My Eyes is a Danish mobile app that aims to help blind and visually impaired people to recognize objects and cope with everyday situations. An online community of sighted volunteers receive photos or videos from randomly assigned affected individuals and assist via live chat. The app is currently available for Android and iOS.

A visually impaired person starts a live stream showing their view from their cell-phone camera. They are assigned, through a phone call or chat, a random volunteer who speaks the same language and who is in the same time zone. This allows the volunteer to describe an object and assist the visually impaired person, such as guiding the person to move their camera, read instructions, or clean up a spill. Through speech synthesis, content can be read out loud.

DB 122631 The Blind Woodsman by John Furniss and Anni Furniss This inspiring autobiography is about a man who finds true joy after struggling with depression, drug addiction, anxiety, financial despair and a failed suicide attempt at the age of 16. Despite being blind, John is now a highly skilled woodworker creating incredible pieces of art in complete darkness. This story that will give hope and inspiration to those dealing with depression, addiction and the many anxiety driven stresses in our lives.

DB 124197 Ian Fleming: The Complete Man by Nicholas Shakespeare Ian Fleming's greatest creation, James Bond, has had an enormous impact on our culture. Fleming himself was more mysterious and subtle than anything he wrote. Ian's childhood set the pattern for his ambition to be "the complete man", and he would strive for the means to achieve this "completeness" all his life.
